Pastor Brock's Experiences In India

"*Namaste*" - the greeting we learned, the greeting we used, the greeting that has stayed with me, in and from India. From a Christian perspective, it can be translated as "when my spirit meets your spirit, may I see the Christ within you."

India as a country is about one third the size of the United States, with a population of over one billion. That's a lot of people in a relatively small space. Plus, Indian culture and history goes back three thousand, five hundred years. It is a country, culture, and people steeped in traditions.

We were primarily in two locations. We began and ended our journey in Hyderabad, one of the major cities of central India. Hyderabad (adjacent to sister city Secundabad), home to about eight million, was founded in the 1500's, and has continued to be a central part of the culture. It is also home to the REACH house, central gathering of all the groups that come to work at the orphanage, located along the southeastern coast in Bapatla.

We began our acclamation to India under the tutelage of Kusuma Paul, founder of REACH School. REACH was founded in the mid-1980's after Kusuma and her family returned from the United States after a several year stay in Minnesota. Her husband, Victor (currently the retired bishop of the India Lutheran Church) studied at Luther Seminary, St. Paul. When they returned to Bapatla, she discovered three children living with her elderly parents - housing them, feeding them and sending them to school. Kusuma asked them "why are you doing this? Because it needs to be done", was the reply. "But what will happen to them when you die?" "God will provide."

A friend from her days in St. Paul, Mary Rauk, came to visit, and had an epiphany: this is what Kusuma should do - take care of the orphans, the children who had no one. Sometime during that same year, Kusuma was contacted by a female friend from Seminary. This woman had just been informed she was unable to bear children. She had heard of Kusuma's work with children in the states (where she provided childcare at Luther Seminary) and in India. Was there an orphan she could adopt? Working with the Hyderabad hospital, Kusuma found a baby born to an unwed Muslim woman. She took the baby home without asking or telling her husband. Because of Kusuma's love and care the child thrived, and after about a year was able to bring her to the states to her adoptive family.

The original orphanage (or hostel, as they are referred to) which was built by her parents today houses around 110 girls. The school/boys dorm, about a mile and a half away, houses 130 boys, along with many of the staff, and is the primary campus. In addition to the 240 youth (aged one to nineteen years), another 110 from the community attend the school. They have a very high achievement rate in academics, and many of the students are able to continue on to college (or what we would call vocational training).

During our two weeks in Bapatla, we were able to complete many repairs to the girl's dorm, and bring about some upgrades at both sites. At the girl's dorm, the team was able to repaint the entire building, both inside and out; repair/repaint the windows and doors. Through local contractors, we repaired the down spouts and drainage system; extended the chimney for the cook stove above the roof line (it had stopped mid-second floor, allowing smoke and fumes to enter the sleeping quarters); installed additional sewage containment units and installed additional lights and ceiling fans. At the school we not only purchased all of the school books for all of the students for the entire school year, but had additional lights and ceiling fans installed in several of the classrooms as well.

Side By Side is one of the many ministries of Youth Encounter, a pan-Lutheran organization that has been around for several decades. This summer there were two teams in India (the second team south of us near Chanaie), a team in Poland, and one in Tanzania. They also sponsor Spoke Folk, a bicycle ministry. Throughout the school year Youth Encounter has several Youth Quakes, weekend long gatherings aimed at junior and senior high youth.

UPDATE: We recently got word from the Bishop of the Konde Diocese with a report on how the money donated by the Lower Susquehanna Synod congregations for the Virtual Sea Container was used. This is the money you gave to this project through your offering in the Lenten self-denial boxes in 2004, a total of \$2,000.00. The monies are being used as follows: The monthly salary and pension for a co-worker with the AIDS Voluntary Counseling and Testing Center in Tukuyu was provided; Itete Hospital bought a vital signs monitoring machine, a photocopy machine, and a blood glucose monitoring machine; Scholarships were given for twelve health workers upgrading their education in various colleges in Tanzania.

The Virtual Sea Container program is an ongoing project of the Medical Needs Subcommittee of the Konde Committee. They are hoping to send another report as soon as they reach the \$10,000 goal.

Thank you for your giving and your prayers as our brothers and sisters in Christ continue to use the money wisely in bringing compassion, mercy, and love to their communities and congregations.

Most of our classes are team-taught, and new talent is always sought. Specifically, there is a need for more teachers and assistants for our kindergarten through fifth grade classes, which make up the rotational program meaning that teachers are exchanged every three weeks or so throughout the year. More teachers are needed as well for the Exceptional Folks Class, an adult special-needs class. The Exceptional Folks teachers rotate also.

To teach or assist, no experience is required beyond interest and enthusiasm. Resources, direction, and support are all provided.

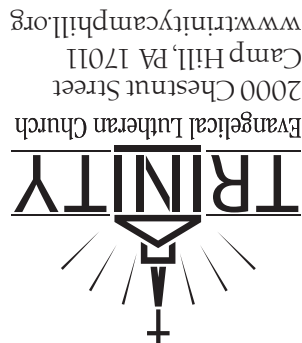
