Accompanying him will be Randy Day, Minister of Music at St. John's Episcopal Church in Lancaster and Instructor of keyboard and strings at the Lititz Academy of Music. LUTHER ALIVE

The beloved and radical professor of Biblical studies at the University of Wittenberg, the Augustinian Friar Martin Luther, nailed his 95 theses to the Wittenberg Castle Church door on October 31, 1517. His public-action went virtually unnoticed. One of his successors of the so-called Lutheran faith, **Dr. William Stotler** has agreed to explain Luther's life actions.

Luther Alive, a five-week course will be offered at **Sup and Study** on Wednesdays, beginning on February 16 at 6:30 p.m. and on Sundays beginning February 20 at 9:30 a.m.

Getting to know Martin Luther and his multifaceted character will begin by examining the early years of his life when his father Hans and mother Margaretha (i.e., Margaret, Hanna), sent him to Mansfield and Eisenach for his early education. Dr. Stotler will develop the story of the obscure, many friar tackling the giant powers of church and state and tell of his disguise as a knight and tenderness as husband and father. By probing straight to the heart of Christendom's trouble, Luther's great adroitness in interpreting Scriptures commenced the great Reformation as we know it today.

Along with subject material, Dr. Stotler will show slides from his recent trip to Germany, where he visited the cities of Eisleben (where Luther was born and died), Eisenach (Wartburg Castle), and Wittenberg.

Mrs. Elizabeth Winters has made several trips to Germany with her late husband, The Reverend Doctor Matthew Winters. Elizabeth will present the character of Luther's wife, Katherin von Bora. A fresh examination of Martin Luther will be explored with those attending this course - **Luther Alive**.

Dr. Stotler completed 15 graduate hours in Luther Studies at Pacific Lutheran Theological Seminary, Berkeley, CA, with Dr. Robert Goeser, Mentor. He completed his Doctor of Ministry at the Lutheran Theological Seminary, Gettysburg, and with Dr. Bruce E. Schein, Yale University. His doctoral dissertation, *The Via Dolorosa: A Specious Tradition* was completed in 1980.

"I WANT TO WIN GOLD FOR MY COUNTRY."

Derek Eshenour, a member of Trinity will be competing in the Special Olympics World Games in Nagano, Japan February 26 through March 5. This competition involves 2,800 athletes from 80 countries.

Derek will represent Pennsylvania in short track speed skating, competing in the 500, 800 and 1,000 meter events over 14 days.

To qualify, Derek had to win gold medals at the local and state levels. Only one male and one female finalist are selected and Derek received the male spot for Pennsylvania.

Derek started his training by running long distance from June to November and has been on the ice since September to earn his chance to go to Japan as part of Team USA. As a member of Team USA he spent the first week of December traveling on his own to a training camp in Colorado where the entire team "trained hard" from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. each day. The camp is a supportive community that helps build confidence and establish relationships to help the athletes be ready for this level of competition.

Derek is the son of Brett and Michelle Eshenour. He has been competing for 14 years, beginning when he was eight years old.

When I met with Derek, the first thing he said was "**I want to win gold for my county.**" I then asked what he expects it will be like in Japan. "Different than America. You have to take your shoes off" when you enter a home. He has been learning Japanese words and as an example said "*Ohio*, that means hello or good morning." All athletes will spend their first five days (before the start of the games) with Japanese host families.

Derek will leave on February 20 for Nagano. A service of Farewell and God Speed will be held at the Contemporary Service on February 13.

STAFF NOTES

“Ring around a Rosie...”

“A pocket full of posies... Ashes, ashes, we all fall DOWN!”

And with that final shout, the little girls fell in a heap (as well as a fit of giggles) in the corner of the nearly empty restaurant. Allowing the young children to play “Ring around a Rosie” was a harmless way for them to burn excess energy and pass time while waiting for their meal to arrive. Those of us at other tables smiled, remembering that game from our own childhoods.

Ashes, ashes, we all fall down. That's what those ashes placed on our foreheads on February 9 mean. We are fallen people. We are broken human beings. We can move through life, navigating successfully around dangerous corners, and then promptly trip over our own two feet... or our own big mouth. And we fall down, or, worse yet, we cause others to stumble. The ashes we bear on our bodies remind us of our inability (or unwillingness) to live out God's commands. They remind us that we sin.

Those ashes also remind us of sin's consequence. You and I and all human beings will eventually die. Our bodies will decay and turn to dust, to ashes.

The mark of the ashes on our foreheads is not a simple dark splotch, devoid of shape. It is formed in the shape of a cross. The cross is the reminder that in spite of, and in the midst of, our fallen state, God has entered our human history. Death and the grave were never God's intention for the human creatures he made. He intended for us to have life, and to have life abundantly in Him.

Receiving that mark of the ashes may make us gulp in embarrassment at the memory of our failures, the ways we have wronged others, the times we've acted like we were God. But because that mark is in the shape of the cross, it reminds us that the cross of Christ stands before us always to offer mercy and to lead us into tomorrow.

Ashes, ashes, we all fall down. And the Lord, who is gracious and compassionate, slow to anger and abounding in steadfast love, reaches down to pick us up.

HEALTH MINISTRIES AT CHRIST LUTHERAN CHURCH

There is a powerful, compassionate outreach ministry taking place at Christ Lutheran Church in the Allison Hill area of Harrisburg. Known as Medical Outreach Service, it is the shared mission of Holy Spirit Hospital and Christ Lutheran Church to extend the healing ministry of Jesus Christ.

Medical Outreach Service was launched in 1995 when Jody Silliker, an RN from Holy Spirit Hospital, was sent to the St. Frances Soup Kitchen armed with a first aid kit and a blood pressure cuff. Her tasks were to identify those who were falling through the cracks of the healthcare system, to help them access the services they needed or when necessary, to create those services. The first year she provided 257 patient visits. Within a year another nurse was hired to help. As community trust grew and the needs grew, the Service moved into a larger space on the second floor above the soup kitchen.

During this period, Jody Silliker graduated from Gettysburg Seminary, was ordained and was called to serve Christ Lutheran Church. When it became evident that the Medical Outreach Service needed more space, it moved from the soup kitchen to a larger, renovated space in the basement of Christ Lutheran Church, where Pastor Silliker still leads the clinic. They began seeing patients there in July of 2004.

The clinic, staffed by nurses, a clerk-receptionist-translator and volunteers, is a free, drop-in clinic open every weekday. Every month it provides 900 patient visits with first aid, simple lab tests, health assessments, health education, medical case managements and items necessary to health, such as blankets, underwear, hygiene products and gloves. The Medical Outreach Service also provides 60 prescription medicines and 300 over-the-counter medicines every month. In addition, the Health Ministries of Christ Lutheran Church include a food voucher program, a free baby furniture bank, a medical supply bank and a twice a month visit from the Mission of Mercy mobile doctor's office and pharmacy.

More than 89 percent of the clients live on incomes below the federal poverty line: 65 percent of them live on less than half of that amount. Approximately one-third are homeless and one third do not speak English. The health care issues related to poverty range from diabetic consequences to parasites, from severe asthma to complex infections. Spiritual and emotional destitution are often complicating factors. The clinic also functions as a hospitality site for the homeless. They are welcome to sit and read, use the telephone and have coffee.

Christ Lutheran Church is a small congregation in a large, old building. Support from outside the congregation is vital to the continuation of its mission. The Social Ministry Committee of Trinity has designated funds to this ministry. Please include all the Health Care Ministries of Christ Lutheran Church in your prayers.

Pastor Silliker invites members of Trinity to visit her congregation for worship at 10:30 a.m. any Sunday and to stay for a tour of the clinic after the service.

PARISH MINISTRY

Trinity now has an Automated External Defibrillator (AED). Most cardiac arrests occur away from a hospital. Prompt use of an AED increases the chance of survival for victims.

An update on the AED for all members currently certified will be held in the Library on February 26 from 8:00 a.m. to 12 noon. This informal session will include a review and an opportunity to ask questions and refresh skills. There will be no charge. Just drop in anytime during this period.

February Is Heart Month. Many people think a heart attack is sudden and intense, where a person clutches his or her chest and falls over. The truth is that many heart attacks start slowly, as a mild pain or discomfort. If you feel such a symptom, you may not be sure what's wrong. Your symptoms may even come and go. Even those who have had a heart attack may not recognize their symptoms, because the next attack can have entirely different symptoms.

Everyone should learn the warning signs of a heart attack:

Chest discomfort. Most heart attacks involve discomfort in the center of the chest that lasts for more than a few minutes, or goes away and comes back. The discomfort can feel like uncomfortable pressure, squeezing, fullness, or pain.

Discomfort in other areas of the upper body. This can include pain or discomfort in one or both arm, the back, neck, jaw, or stomach.

Shortness of breath. May include breaking out in a cold sweat, nausea, or light-headedness.

Often the only symptoms for women are a feeling of indigestion or pain in the abdomen or feeling sick or uneasy.

Learn the signs of a heart attack. Even if you're not sure it's a heart attack, you should still have it checked out. Fast action can save lives and it may be your own.

I am almost ashamed to be writing this thank you so long after all Pastor Hardy and this congregation has done for me and my family.

Pastor Hardy had a beautiful funeral service for my son Tim earlier this year. He also helped me through the deaths of my sisters shortly thereafter. I'm not sure I could have gotten through all of this heartache if it wasn't for Pastor Hardy and my wonderful friends at Trinity.

I want to thank everyone for all their prayers, cards, flowers and dinners that kept me and my family going through these very difficult times.

We spent all summer hoping chemotherapy would help my 16-year-old
