Why Do You Come Here?

"Why do you come here?" Sherman asked. It was the morning of my fourth turn at the Harrisburg Winter Homeless Shelter. Sherman, one of the guests, is a well groomed, articulate man standing in line for a cup of coffee.

Many members of Trinity helped prepare and serve the Thanksgiving Dinner at the shelter. Then, in teams of three or four, volunteers stayed overnight with the guests. At 9:00 p.m. each night, about 35 men and a few women come in from the cold to sleep on mats on the floor at Zion Lutheran Church on 4th Street in Harrisburg. A staff person from HELP screens, does paper work and then clears each guest as they enter. Before lights out at 10:30 p.m., there is time for coffee, cards and conversation. I played my first hand of poker and with beginner's luck, I won, causing much hilarity and joking. Each time they passed me after that they called me "The gambler".

Doc has a long beard and wears a civil war style hat. Chester is a heavy set black man who walks with a limp and wears a cross on a beaded necklace he made. Ron is a handsome young Hispanic man who works in a restaurant. Warren has splotches on his face and is missing his front teeth. He is embarrassed about his appearance and doesn't see that in spite of the splotches, he is a good looking man.

Tuesday night I sat at the piano and played Christmas Carols. As I played "I Wonder As I Wander", Paula came up behind me and sang. She knew all the words . . . "I wonder as I wander, out under the sky. How Jesus our Savior, came for to die, for poor ordinary people, like you and like I. I wonder as I wander, out under the sky." When we finished she excitedly hugged me and said "That is a favorite of mine! I haven't sung that in years and years!"

Sleeping on a mat marked with a 'V' for volunteer, I caught a few hours of sleep while the other members of the team talked quietly under dimmed lights in the kitchen. We took turns resting. Volunteers Gordon and Val both were awake all night, but not the guests. They snored heavily, appreciating being off the streets.

As I poured his cup of coffee, I carefully answered Sherman's question. "This scares me a bit, to come here. But I know it is a good thing to do and I think

God places scary things in front of us to help us grow. Does that make sense?" Sherman said "Yes, it does."

Indeed, I think God often offers us opportunities to move out from what is comfortable into areas that scare us. Members of Trinity will again take a turn at the shelter at the end of March, 2007.

God's Time

The Old Testament lesson for January 1 in our Revised Common Lectionary cycle is Ecclesiastes 3:1-8. How fitting that as a new year begins, we read these familiar words:

For everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven:

A time to be born, and a time to die;

A time to plant, and a time to pluck up what is planted;

A time to kill, and a time to heal;

A time to break down, and a time to build up;

A time to weep, and a time to laugh;

A time to mourn, and a time to dance;

A time to throw away stones, and a time to gather stones together;

A time to embrace, and a time to refrain from embracing;

A time to seek, and a time to lose;

A time to keep, and a time to throw away;

A time to tear, and a time to sew;

A time to keep silence, and a time to speak;

A time to love, and a time to hate;

A time for war, and a time for peace.

The truth is you and I will experience many of these moments of time in the year to come. Even if we don't particularly wish to experience those moments. Often we find ourselves "stuck" in a period of time. Often we lack patience in these moments of time, or we're uncertain just which time we're **supposed** to be in. As I write this article, we are in a time of protracted war, and, oh, how we long for peace! Some of us are grieving losses of the past years, and we can't stop the tears from flowing. Some of us are making plans to move—what should we keep? What should we throw away? And some of us struggle daily with decisions about when to keep silent and when to speak up. The writer of Ecclesiastes understood well the human experience.

As we look ahead to 2007, the words of Thomas F. Fischer are helpful. He studied Ecclesiastes 3:1-8, then offered these thoughts for church leaders, though I believe they speak to any disciple of Jesus Christ. May his words remind you of God's patient and purposeful presence in **all** of time:

Lord, I know there is a time for me. Lead in Your time, Lord!

Help me discern Your ways . . . and Your time.

But most of all, may I always be Your servant in Your time, Lord.

Lord, in Your time there is always . . .

A time for strength, a time for hope, a time for life.

Lord, in Your time, use me . . . and I will lead.

Call me . . . and I will follow.

Lord, all this I will do . . . in Your time.

Greetings from Grace Lutheran NOLA

Greetings to our friends in Christ from Grace Evangelical Lutheran Church of New Orleans! This Thanksgiving marks our second Thanksgiving since Hurricane Katrina changed our lives forever. Grace Lutheran Church stood in approximately seven feet of water for almost two weeks, causing over \$1.3 million in damages. With insurance payments of just \$403,000, we were not sure what our future would be. Virtually everything on the first level was destroyed; our Sanctuary, office, Narthex, Fellowship Hall, kitchen, daycare facility and classrooms. The upper level contained only a few classrooms and storage. Please go to: www.gracenola.com/katrina.htm to view pictures taken shortly after the flood waters receded.

Our congregation was scattered to the far corners of the country. Gradually, they began to return to assess their damaged homes, neighborhoods and businesses and to pick up the pieces. Many lived near our church in the Lakeview area of New Orleans and

suffered extensive flooding. Worship services were held in a local funeral home chapel beginning in October. Some may think a funeral home an unusual place for worship, but New Orleanians are adaptable! We were thrilled (and thankful) to be able to return to the church building for our Easter services. Donations of chairs, hymnals and an organ were blessings from churches around the country. The church had been gutted by tireless volunteers (angels!). We had a temporary electrical pole installed to provide a limited amount of electricity, which meant no-air-conditioning. If you have ever visited New Orleans in the warmer months, you can understand how important air-conditioning can be. We discussed moving back to the funeral home, but ultimately the congregation wanted to remain in the church, even in its gutted state. In June a very warm congregation cooled themselves with fans made of small paper plates. Later that month, we had our air-conditioning units installed; however, since we still only had the temporary pole, we had to choose between lights or AC. Well, we chose AC, even though it got so dark during a storm the assistant minister had to use a flashlight to read the lessons! This experience has changed the lives of our congregation and community forever.

Though so much was lost, we feel that so much more was gained. The outpouring of prayers, volunteer workers, gifts offered and monetary donations given have displayed clearly that God's power is working through his people. We are so very grateful for your prayers and gifts to Grace Church. We have received approximately \$290,000 in donations of money, time and replacement items. Although we're not back to "normal" yet, we are at about 75% of where we were before the storm. We honestly did not know if we would be able to open the church doors again. We could not have done it without you!

There still is much to do, however. The neighborhood of Lakeview needs our help: the majority of the area remains much the same as it was immediately following the storm. Through our rebuilding effort, we hope to be an inspiration to other residents and businesses in the area. It is our intention to host volunteer groups at the church for months to come. With God's help and yours, "we are making all things new."

This Thanksgiving we gave thanks to God and each and every one of you. May God bless you and keep you safe!

Volunteer Outreach... Living God's Mission In God's World

As reported in an earlier issue of Trinity Parish Joyce Grier has been a vital force in the **Operation Shoebox** project of supporting military men and women deployed overseas. To date (December) Joyce reports they have sent out 520 care packages including six to Trinity members. Operation Shoebox is a project of the Capital Club, Verizon Telecom Pioneers, a non-profit organization of active and retired employees dedicated to "answering the call of those in need."

On another note, Operation Shoebox was entered into the Pioneer Telecom Challenge under the category of Military/Technology. The challenge is open to Pioneer clubs throughout the U.S. and Canada. Joyce reports they received word they have made it to the final four. First prize is \$1,000, second \$500.

One of the high points for Joyce is when she receives thank you letters. The morning she gave me this information she received a letter. Following are excerpts from that letter... "you guys are doing such good work. It makes me feel so much better about what we are doing, knowing we are helping to preserve a place where good people can be safe, comfortable and protected....Many of the guys stay up late to talk with family on the phone. It's hard for the kids not to have daddy home with them, but I have heard more than once, 'I'll be home soon, sweetheart. Daddy loves you...'"

Another project Joyce chairs is Verizon Reads. This Telecom Pioneers program distributes student dictionaries to local elementary schools. In October her team presented dictionaries to the two second grade classes at Northside Elementary School in Mechanicsburg.

Donna Campbell, a Trinity member and a second grade teacher at Northside arranged for a school project to have students write letters to the military which were then included in the packages. All classes in the school participated. Donna reports the students have already received some responses. The letter writing was an enjoyable experience for the students.

From Your Director of Learning Ministries

I can say Happy New Year (and I will—Happy New Year!), though actually we are already several weeks into the new Church year, which began on the first Sunday in Advent (December 3, 2006 this year). Nonetheless, I do hope and pray for a 2007 filled with blessings.

New brochures have been distributed listing and describing our offerings in learning ministry for the winter and spring terms (so to speak). Brochures are in the Gathering Space, the Narthex, and the church office or I may be contacted.

Though it may be a stretch to think of summer, more of a stretch to plan for it, the time for registering for summer camping in the synod is at hand. Registration materials are sent from the camp association office to families who have camped before. The church has an arrangement with the camps regarding the scholarship, so all registrants need do is indicate on the application that the scholarship from the church is desired. If the scholarship is not wanted, that may be indicated as well. If there are situations for which more funding is needed beyond the “automatic” scholarship in order to provide a camping experience, I may be contacted. I’m happy to work to have these needs responded to.

The Wednesday Morning Women’s Bible Study begins January 10 and is promoted elsewhere in the newsletter. Joining the study after it starts is not a problem.

For families and those wanting to be informed about families, I recommend reading the *Central Penn Parent Magazine*? The magazine is free and distributed throughout our area. Trinity receives copies via our weekday preschool, and there are typically enough magazines to go around. Thus far, I have found the contents of the magazine timely and informative. I can’t say that everything in the publication is always going to be sterling, but I have not been disappointed thus far. The magazine appears to be inclusive if not comprehensive in sharing information and perspective on issues and trends affecting child education and the family overall.

Speaking of child education, we are in the process of enrolling students for our weekday preschool, the Trinity Preschool Playgroup. We have classes for two-and-a-half year-olds through pre-kindergarten. Interviews and applications may be received through Heather Rose, our preschool director. Her extension is

SO, what is this CACCC all about??? "I know they sell Advent Calendars every year." In 1988 Trinity along with five other local churches started a mission to provide affordable, safe and nurturing child care for families in need in our area (often single parent households - the "working poor"). We started with 10 children and one teacher and now serve more than 200 children daily in six centers with 55 full and part-time employees. The member churches and our fundraising efforts provide scholarship money to families who are unable to pay current child care rates. Many of the families are on the waiting list for Pennsylvania's Child Care Network to subsidize them (this process often takes many months to set up!) We gave out more than \$15,000 in scholarship aid in 2005 alone (the 2006 numbers aren't available yet). The scholarship fund is running in the RED - more than \$5,000 over our current member church support -- Trinity, St. Peter's and St. Tim's (the 3 Lutheran church participants), Mt. Cavalry Episcopal, and Camp Hill United Methodist. The needs of our families are growing every year and we welcome private donations and fundraising support to meet our commitment to these families. One of our major fundraisers is the **ADVENT CALENDAR** sale, which our congregation so wonderfully supports. Try something new and fun! Come learn to dance, socialize with friends and support a good cause all in one night!! **(Learn to) DANCE LIKE A STAR!!**
