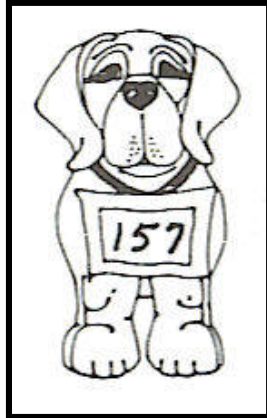

STAFF NOTES

Worship 101

Unless you were too busy consuming chocolate eggs in the middle of worship on Easter Sunday here at Trinity, you might have noticed additional verbiage in our bulletins. Okay, so you **were** busy unwrapping the colorful foil and consuming those chocolate eggs and you **didn't** notice that our bulletins offered explanation for why we do the crazy thing we do called "worship."

You may remember that about a year ago, we produced a worship bulletin for our services that weekend that was considered "instructional" in nature. Our former vicar, seminarian Mike Louia, helped write brief explanations of the various points of a Lutheran worship service, and we printed them in the bulletin at each of those points. As plans for worship on this most recent Easter Sunday were being made, we decided to incorporate those explanations right into the bulletins as a teaching tool for the many parishioners and visitors who would worship with us that day.

An example of this instructive material? The apostolic greeting hails from Paul's final words in his Second Letter to the Corinthians: *The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God, and the communion of the Holy Spirit be with you all.* We explained that standing for the Gospel reading shows respect for Jesus Christ who is revealed in the words we read. We reminded worshipers that the Passing of the Peace reflects our Lord's first words to his disciples after his resurrection, which was *Peace be with you.*

But besides offering instruction about the various small pieces of a worship service, this instructional bulletin offers us the bigger picture of worship as well.

First, there is a purposeful flow to what we do together. It's not just doing what we "feel like doing" in a particular worship, but we do **these specific things:** We gather. We confess with honesty our failings and ask forgiveness. We offer adoration. We listen as God speaks to us in scripture and sermon. Then we respond to that word with praise and a statement of our faith, with prayer and the sharing of our abundance. We eat the visible word of God in a simple meal, and finally we are sent out to share what we have learned and experienced with others that they, too, would know God's love. (Now, our various worship services here at Trinity may incorporate these acts in different ways, but **all** our worship services hold fast to these things.)

Second, our worship life together binds us to the Christians of centuries past—those who in fact witnessed the Risen Christ with their own eyes, and declared it to others, who then proceeded to declare it to the next generation. We follow in the footsteps of the first congregations who gathered together to sing and praise, listen to scripture, pray, and break bread. We learn how to be the Church, as those first congregations did, through our commitment to regular worship.

If you were consuming chocolate eggs on Easter morn, and missed reading that instructional bulletin in worship—never fear! We intend to print those simple but helpful explanations about worship four times a year. On June 7, when our young folks affirm their Baptism at confirmation, our bulletins for all our weekend worship services will contain the instructional portions again. It makes for good reading and good learning. It also makes for good, good worship.

- Our church library is open every day of the week

THE YG FUNDRAISER CALENDAR

New Mission Project: Coupons for Overseas Military Families

Each week, many of us clip coupons from the newspaper, but don't know what to do with the coupons that aren't clipped. Trinity is kicking off a new mission project: collect unused and recently expired coupons that will be mailed to an overseas U.S. military base through the Overseas Coupon Program (OCP). The families stationed at this base will then choose the coupons they want, save valuable dollars and stretch their budgets by using them at bases' Commissary and BX/PX.

All Trinity members can help. Simply cut all the coupons from the weekly coupon booklets, save the ones that you will use, and sort the rest into food and non-food categories. You can also include recently expired coupons (up to one month) with the other coupons. If you would like, you can also sort each category by monetary value (i.e. all \$1 coupons together). Then bring the coupons to church and deposit them in the box located near the Gathering Space front door.

To help with sorting, here is a breakdown of the two categories:

Food includes: cereals, pasta, baby food, baby products (especially diapers and wipes), frozen foods, produce, meats, dairy, etc. Anything that humans consume and have nutritional value.

Non-food category includes: medicines, vitamins, pet food, toiletries, paper products, and cleaners, anything that is not for human nutrition/consumption.

Buy one-get-one free and similar type coupons should be included. **Please note:** The following should **NOT** be included with the coupon collection: store coupons, restaurant coupons, or a mail-in coupon (such as for a rebate). Also, **coupons should not be more than one month expired** since it will take a little time to forward the coupons to the base, and for the families to sort through the coupons.

We also need volunteers to help sort the coupons by monetary value and count each pile. This number is needed since OCP asks that every group sending coupons complete a report with the shipment totals. Trinity members will see the results of their work after each shipment. Each mailing will be posted in the *Trinity Parish*, with the year-to-date totals included after the first shipment. Last year, coupons with a value of more than \$10 million were mailed to bases overseas. Let's see how much Trinity can collect!

From the April 20 meeting:

- Studied "Faith During Economic Strife" from the March 2009 issue of *The Lutheran* magazine during opening devotions.
- Adopted a plan for Trinity, Camp Hill, to provide pastoral services to the congregation of Trinity, South Harrisburg, beginning May 16, 2009.
- Approved Vicar Cheri Korte's intern project to build a labyrinth with the agreement of and on the property of Mount Calvary Episcopal Church, Camp Hill and to solicit voluntary donations at Trinity to help cover the cost.
- Granted permission to the Frederickson Library to use Trinity's Fellowship Hall as a rain venue for their outdoor concert on July 24, 2009.
- Learned that demolition of the house at 1915 Market Street has been approved by Camp Hill Borough Council and authorized Pastor Hardy to coordinate with the Camp Hill Police and Fire Departments use of this structure for training purpose prior to demolition.

- Studied "Prayer – It Doesn't Have to be so Difficult" from the April 2009 issue of *The Lutheran* magazine during opening devotions.
- Accepted the invitation of Roland & Josephine Freund to host a picnic at their home on Monday, August 10 for Council members and their families.
