Would you like to speak with healthcare experts to get facts and advice to improve the physical and spiritual health of yourself and your family? Trinity will host a Community Health Fair for all ages on Saturday, April 17, 2010 from 9:00 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. The event is free and open to the public. Community Health Fair participants will be offered exercise tips and nutritional guidelines, simple lifestyle changes, news on various conditions and diseases and information on making informed healthcare decisions. Children's programs and activities will include *Veggie Tales* and *David and Goliath* stories with guided discussion, healthy habit lessons on hand washing and teeth brushing, fire and personal safety as well as information on bullying.

Your next opportunity to donate at Trinity is Saturday, April 17 at the "Community Health Fair 2010." The blood mobile will be here from 9:00 - 12:00 a.m. Since this is eleven weeks from the January drive, we moved the May drive to June 27 to accommodate people who may want to donate all three times!

We have several new handouts: "Excuses," and "Common Questions and Concerns about Blood Donations." There will also be an updated handout of locations where you can donate blood, including places and times. It's Beginning to Look A Lot Like Christmas...

You're probably wondering about the title of my article. Don't worry—there's no need to search through this newsletter to see if we accidentally slipped you the December issue. And don't suppose, just because I'm writing these words in early March while snow remains on the ground, that I am confused about day and season. No—I write this for our April *Trinity Parish*, and I know you're reading it sometime just prior to or following Good Friday.

Even so, that Christmas carol pops into my head: "It's beginning to look a lot like Christmas..." Or if it doesn't look like Christmas, at least I now understand the event of Good Friday is the very bookend for Christmas. Not that we would necessarily connect these two events: The incarnation of our Lord, born in Bethlehem. The crucifixion of our Lord, dying in Jerusalem. The days are hardly celebrated in the same way. One day we sing for joy and light candles to cast out all darkness. The other day our voices are nearly muted with sorrow, candles are extinguished, and it is dark. Very dark.

Perhaps that explains why some folks are content to stick with Christmas alone—that feel-good, highly-secularized holiday. Jesus' birth is simply much more marketable and palatable than Jesus' death.

But these words penned by theologian Douglas John Hall haunt me with their truth: "The Christmas story is beautiful because it affirms and celebrates the great good and eternal worth of all creation...But if the Christian narrative were to end with Christmas it would not yet reach us in the reality of our being. The divine love that is ready to suffer birth in human form must follow through, if it is really love for creatures, for us. It must suffer life, not only birth; it must suffer death, too." (*The Cross in our Context: Jesus and the Suffering World*, p. 38)

Good Friday is the bookend for Christmas. God's story of loving and saving us does not reach fulfillment at the manger. That's only part of the story. Just as you and I were born, and will all eventually die, our "God-with-us" (Emmanuel) can only really be "God-with-us" when he knows all about us and experiences all our humanness from our earthly beginning to our earthly end. Then God and his love are, at last, as close to us as they can possibly be.

Good Friday takes Christmas—the incarnation of Jesus Christ, the Word made flesh—to its logical extension in God's plan of salvation. Yes, Christmas is a time for rejoicing, but I say TGIF! Thank God it's Friday! Thanks be to God for Friday, and his ultimate gift of love.

The Triduum

On Maundy Thursday we begin the *Triduum*, which means "The Three Days." The Triduum includes Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Easter Eve. The three liturgies on these days are considered to be one service of worship. No benediction separates our worship on these days. We leave the worship room in silence from each liturgy for just a while in order to return and continue participating in the great mystery and miracle of our redemption.

What is Trinity's Ongoing Leading the Way to New Ministries Capital Campaign?

During 2000, Trinity undertook a \$3,810,000 project consisting of the construction of Fellowship Hall and the Gathering Space, construction of the classrooms located above Fellowship Hall, renovation of the kitchen, partial renovation of the nave and chancel, and repair/reconstruction of the chancel organ, as well as other related repairs and improvements. The initial plan of finance for the project included undertaking the first phase of a capital campaign, entitled *Leading the Way to New Ministries*, and obtaining a \$3 million construction loan. This was followed by the second phase of the capital campaign, which ran from 2005 through May of 2008, the maturity date of the construction loan.

During 2008, Trinity undertook the third phase of the capital campaign and obtained a \$1,500,000 loan, the proceeds of which were applied toward the refinancing of the outstanding balance of the construction loan referred to above and the funding of \$300,000 of other previously incurred capital expenditures related to Trinity's facilities (including the purchase of 1915 Market Street). All capital campaign receipts have been and will continue to be applied toward reduction of the loan principal; interest on the loan has been and will continue to be paid from Trinity's operating budget. The 2008 loan will mature in May of 2015. At February 28, 2010, the outstanding loan balance was \$1,036,496.50.

The current Capital Campaign Committee consists of Frank Leber (chair), Robert Frymoyer, Louis Grammes, Barbara Kriebel and Shaun Eisenhauer.

Additional Palm Sunday and Easter Services at 8:30 a.m.

In the recent past we have offered an additional contemporary service on Easter. This year we will offer additional services on both Easter (April 4) and Palm Sunday (March 28) to accommodate the higher attendance those days. These additional services will begin at 8:30 a.m. This time slot was chosen because 8:30 a.m. is the start time for the new Contemporary Worship Service coming in September. You know, in some communities in Africa they simply open the windows and doors and seat the worshippers outside when all the pews inside are filled, but that seems impractical here in central PA!

The Worship Task force is developing a unique and shorter format for the 8:30 a.m. service which will be different from our present 10:45 a.m. service. However, because of the nature of both Palm Sunday and Easter, and because we have not yet completed our process of developing the new service format, these first two 8:30 a.m. services will not be exactly like the new service nor will they be exactly like the present 10:45 a.m. service.

Watch for dates in June, July and August when we will do a few "trial runs" at 8:30 a.m. for the new service.

Reaching Out in Service to Local Community

Our committee mission statement says it all – “...called to equip disciples at Trinity to minister to the needy within Central Pennsylvania”. This doesn’t mean that only members of Trinity’s Social Ministry Committee reach out in ministering to the needy. We view our role as providing and facilitating opportunities for all of Trinity’s disciples to find at least one (and hopefully more than one) area of service that fits individual interests, time and abilities.

We had an excellent brainstorming session about ways to expand and focus our church social ministry efforts in February with more than 20 persons participating. Some highlights include:

- Reviewed the various ministries part of Trinity’s Social Ministry program, and re-affirmed the importance of linking volunteer opportunities in each ministry with volunteers from our congregation
- Identified some ministries (e.g. Bethesda Mission, Christ Lutheran Church Medical Ministry) that do not currently have a Trinity liaison and/or limited Trinity volunteer involvement and determined to seek persons to fill these roles
- Received an enthusiastic report on the growth of New Hope Ministries and the new West Shore headquarters
- Learned that Trinity will host the May 15th “Community Connections” breakfast for prison release inmates from the Dauphin County Prison
- Endorsed enthusiastically the monthly Second Saturday service teams that are coordinated by Barbara Musselman to give hands-on assistance to various local projects
- Designated that the one-half Social Ministry share of the annual Lenten Self-Denial box offerings will be used to support new and existing service ministries beyond available funding in the church’s operating budget

From the Missions Committee: Haiti Earthquake Recovery Efforts

The following is an excerpt from a February 10 email from David and Mary Kuck, missionaries Trinity supports in Jamaica:

“We have all been following the news from Haiti with deep concern. Although Jamaica is prone to earthquakes along the same fault system, we only felt a small aftershock here.”

Pastor Livenson Lauvanus, who serves the emerging Lutheran Church in Haiti, wrote that the Episcopal cathedral where he was ordained and the guest house where we visitors stayed are both destroyed. Pastor Livenson had traveled to Florida the day before the earthquake to visit supporting Lutheran churches. He was able to return to Haiti [in early February and lives] on the grounds of the Lutheran World Federation office in Port-au-Prince.

He writes: “I talked to a woman in Carrefour [the epicenter of the quake] who has lost everything. She told me how grateful she is that she is still alive. She said she exists, but is not living because she was deprived of all that could help her to live. I asked her why, and she said to me: ‘To see what took me a lifetime to build all taken away from me in a matter of seconds--it’s an unbearable nightmare that I have to live with my entire life.’ She looked straight in my eyes and said: ‘Son, this is not something that is easy for you and a lot of others to digest or comprehend.’”

The ELCA is actively involved in relief and rebuilding efforts, including help for the Lutheran churches. We hope that church and government efforts will not only be generous but also wise and just, so that out of the rubble the foundation can be laid for a new vision and reality of positive development in Haiti.

Please continue to remember Pastor Lauvanus and his work, David and Mary Kuck, the Lutheran Church in Haiti, and all recovery efforts there in your prayers.
