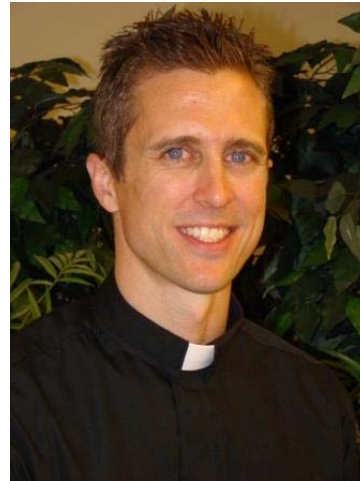

Staff Notes

Sometimes two hands just aren't enough. There is the story of the little boy who came in from playing begging for something to eat. His mother finally settled on a slice of bread smothered in, what else, peanut butter. "But," she insisted, "You have to eat it outside."

Her son was only three. Most doors he could open by wrapping one hand around the knob and sort of dropping his body until turning and pulling became part of the same motion (We can picture this.) The outside door, however, was different. It needed two hands, and here was that slice of bread filling one of them. What to do?

Now, this little fellow had a creative mind. How did he handle this dilemma? He slapped the bread against the wall, peanut butter first. It stuck while he grabbed at the knob with both hands. Once the door was open, he peeled it away from the wall, nearly as good as new!!

He ate his sandwich outside and never made a mess on the floor!

Have you ever really examined your own hands? They are amazing tools. The bones of our hands have thirty different joints, and movements are controlled by more than fifty muscles. Researchers estimate that a typical hand can assume approximately 300 million different useful positions while doing the average of 1,000 separate functions that we assign to it in a day. One-third of the sense organs of our bodies are located in our hands. John Webster called them "curious engines."

What would we do without them? I think of that as I type these words. Latham Sholes, who first put together a working model of the typewriter in the mid-1800's, found that the keys would jam if the typist went too fast. So he deliberately concocted a configuration for the keys that would slow us down. It's the standard keyboard on all English typewriters and computer keyboards, an arrangement called QWERTY. And still our fingers learn, and our hands produce.

Our hands can speak. The grasp of friendship. The touch of healing. The caress of love. Our hands create. John Heming said of Shakespeare, "His mind and hand went together." What a productive combination that was! And who can fail to be amazed at the wonders that leaped from the hands of Michelangelo?

Our hands can destroy as well. Pilate washed his hands of Jesus' blood, which only pointed the way for His death. Lady Macbeth couldn't cleanse her hands of murderous designs with all the water of earth's oceans. Hands can hurt and disable and cripple.

Those same hands can pray. From the depths of sorrow, from the tragedy of our circumstances, we lift our hands toward God. When we can find no words, when our eyes grow dim from searching for answers, when our tongue thickens, our hands can still speak. Lifted hands. Pleading hands. Needy hands. And always, five fingers of love, scarred by the print of nails, grasp us in the never-failing handshake of grace.

But sometimes two hands aren't enough. So God created community, through covenants of old, through Jesus, His son, through the Holy Spirit so that the heavy work of grace, of justice-forming, of mercy-sharing, of peace-proclaiming could be done. Two hands just aren't enough.

What have your hands been doing in Kingdom-building lately?

“Second Saturdays”... ...A Hands On Ministry Program

In an effort to live out our new mission statement, “Disciples in the Making, Making Disciples”, Trinity’s Social Ministry committee has added another opportunity to minister called the “Second Saturdays” work program. “Second Saturdays” is simply a group of men and women from Trinity who are setting aside the second Saturday of the month for hands on support work at some of our area’s outreach ministries’ properties.

Since October of last year we have worked at Habitat for Humanity of Harrisburg, New Hope Ministry’s new location on Trindle Road and Christ Lutheran Church on S. 13th Street in Harrisburg. Other outreach ministries have expressed interest in our help as well.

All of these ministries rely on donations from individuals, churches and other organizations so money is in short supply for labor on their buildings. But the buildings are vital to providing a place to operate their ministry and that is where we can minister to them.

So far we have cleared out and secured an abandoned property and planted shrubs for Habitat. We have repaired water damaged walls and ceilings, winterized old windows, painted halls and stairways and refinished wood work in the sacristy at Christ Lutheran. We also painted a warehouse and helped move furniture at New Hope Ministries. As you can see from the description of jobs done, no high skill level is required just a desire to help others beyond the doors of Trinity.

Come join “Second Saturdays” because the benefits are wonderful. You can help transform a property, minister to organizations that help those in need, enjoy the fellowship that comes from working as a team and live out our new mission of discipleship at Trinity.

Council Update

Each month this column highlights actions and significant items of interest from the most recent meeting(s) of Trinity's Congregation Council.

From the May 2010 Meeting:

- Opened the meeting with a devotional study of *Assessing the Fallout, Sexuality votes cause division, sadness-and hope* from the April 2010 of **The Lutheran**.
- Completed lesson one of Five Developmental Tasks During an Interim Ministry. Pastor Ludwig led the discussion which focused on three topics; coming to terms with history, dealing with grief and celebrating our strengths. Council will complete four additional lessons during the next four Council Meeting.
- The Council's Executive Committee approved the appointment of Allie Martin as Youth Ministry Chair. Allie is replacing Tania Springer. Council recognized Tania for her years of service to Trinity's youth ministry.
- The Executive Committee also approved the membership of Trinity's Going Green Task Force. The task force chaired by Margaret Parker includes Zandra Bishop, Kathleen McGinty, Karl Hausker, Al Sundara and Rachel Hettinger. The Task Force will investigate and recommend environment friendly actions to Council.
- Approved the restoration contracts for the main (Nave) chimney and the re-shingling of the Nave roof. Funding for the projects will come from Trinity's Maintenance and Improvement Reserve Account.
- Received a report highlighting the success of Trinity's Community Health Fair – 2010 and recognized the contributions of the organizing committee led by Judy Hunter. Trinity's Committee Health Fair – 2011 is scheduled to be held on November 5, 2011.

The next meeting of the Congregation Council will be held on Monday, June 14, 2010.



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Artist of the Month

The artist for the month of June is Trinity member Mary Kay Fager. Mary Kay's free lance art career has included work as a painter, a caricaturist, a courtroom artist, an illustrator, a muralist and an artist-in-residence for numerous schools and her own Trinity Church. She has served as a juror in various scholastic and community exhibitions in Central Pennsylvania and has given painting lessons in her studio. She was a charter member of the Women of the Arts and participated in the Harrisburg exhibits. She has also given special workshops and has been a speaker for art associations and civic groups.

Mary Kay received her first training at Moore College of Art in Philadelphia. Her favorite mediums to work in are oils, pen and ink, and pastels. She has exhibited at the National Riverfront Museum in Wilmington, Delaware, William Ris Galleries, Camp Hill, Art Association of Harrisburg, Mechanicsburg Art Center, York Art Association, Central Pennsylvania Business School, Enola, Chester County Art Association, Greenery Restaurant, Wilmington, Delaware, Temple University Center, Harrisburg and numerous businesses, establishments, and churches. She has received numerous awards and prizes throughout Pennsylvania, Maryland and Delaware.

To date, Mary Kay has painted and designed six murals; four are housed in the Education Building of Trinity.

Mary Kay has been employed to render courtroom sketches for WHTM-TV Channel 27 News, WPVI-TV Channel 6 Philadelphia, Channel 17 Philadelphia, Chanel 9 Rochester, WITF Harrisburg, the York Daily Record, the Herald Standard Uniontown, the Reading Eagle Times newspapers and most recently CNN.
