

Laser focus: Let your light shine!

Okay, trivia buffs, this is for you. Who knows what a laser is?

It's actually an acronym for **light amplification by stimulated emission of radiation** (L.A.S.E.R.). Don't you feel better now that you know that?

The basic premise is this: A laser is created when the electrons in the atoms of special glasses or gases absorb energy from an electrical current or another laser and become "excited." The result is more focused energy and light.

Lasers have changed our world in many ways, from taking measurements, to manufacturing, to medicine.

I think lasers can be a metaphor for our church today.

What excites you about the ministry we share? Is it our social ministry capacity? Our worship and music? Our children and youth programs? Our opportunity to improve our church facilities for the next generation?



Is it true? Is Nancy Martin retiring?

The first recommendations are to keep three doors locked at all times: Market Street entrance, outside kitchen door, and the door at the end of the kitchen hallway.


Support our Synod's initiative to end hunger

Two years ago, the Synod held a food-packing event with outstanding results. A YouTube video was produced by Synod youth who served as pages at that year's Assembly (see <https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=ReHaL8r-B1Y>.) In total, 1,200 volunteers packed 415,876 packages of food—enough to feed 2.5 million people!

Grow your faith in our new adult education series

Whoever you are, and whether you're new to Trinity or have been here forever, this series of five classes is for you. Yes, YOU.

Here's why.

Although Trinity welcomes you and everyone who enters our doors, we expect that you will exit those doors changed. That's because—since we are all imperfect—a relationship with God should be transformative.

In other words, your relationship with God will cause you (1) to examine yourself and your actions every minute of every day, (2) recognize where change is needed, and (3) make that transformation. The result is growth.

So let's grow.

Our new classes use stories from three perspectives to guide your transformation:



God's Story (Parts 1 and 2). What a rich, expansive, and amazing story! Hear about it anew. Understand the story of God's love and concern for all people.

- March 18 (Part 1) | **Word of God, Word of Life.** How should you read the Bible? Where to begin?
- March 25 (Part 2) | **Story Matters.** We all love great stories, and the Bible is full of them. But why do they matter? And what can they tell us about living our lives TODAY?

Our Story (Parts 1 and 2). Standing on a rich reformation heritage, we at Trinity work together to share our story in words and actions. As we look beyond our own community, we see we are part of a far greater story. God's story and ours intersect in the missions that God calls us to do.

- April 8 (Part 1) | **Being Lutheran.** What does it mean to be Lutheran? A bridge between other Protestant traditions and the Catholic Church? What is the foundation for Lutheran theology? How does Trinity fit into the ELCA?
- April 15 (Part 2) | **Together We Do More.** The work of the Gospel is carried out through many hands. What missions and programs do we support? What makes members so passionate about projects on which they work? Hear folks talk about how sharing their time and talent strengthens Trinity's story.

Your Story. Trinity cares about your story. We want to walk with you as your story unfolds. It will help you recognize how God works in your life. From babies in our nursery, to toddlers and children and teens, and to young adults and mid-lifers and seniors, we are a better church when YOUR story enriches ours.

- April 22 | **Designed to Serve.** Learn about yourself in ways you may never have imagined! God has designed you for a purpose, but defining that purpose is sometimes a challenge. Let's explore together how our varied gifts, abilities, personalities, and experiences can be used to do God's work.

He has been a guest conductor at Carnegie Hall. He arranged, orchestrated, and won awards for *Civil War Voices*. He conducted the world premiere of his work, *The American Spirit*, at Lincoln Center in May 2011, and the world premiere of his *Requiem* there in May 2013. And there's much more. But whether he's concertizing on the other side of the globe or composing at his home in Kansas City, Missouri, Mark is blessed to live out his mission "to create beautiful music for the world." And Trinity is blessed to have him here.

Inspirational**Did you hear this grateful Trinity member's story?**

If you missed Serena Fedor's real-life story about "Trouble," visit the sermons page on our website at www.trinitycamphill.org/sermons/. You'll be inspired.

Serena entered the hospital last September 1 to give birth to her third son. After an uneventful pregnancy, she didn't see trouble coming. But after 14 hours of labor, things went very wrong.

"I remember the pain that was not like my other two pregnancies. Then my blood pressure dropped, the baby's heart rate dropped, and the rest is a blur," she said. Serena has no memory of the next 15 days, and she relies on her husband, Michael, to explain.

In short, it was unclear if Baby Luke and Serena would live. Serena lost half her body's blood in minutes. She received enough blood to survive her first surgery, but her heart and respiration stopped soon thereafter. It was four minutes until she could be revived.

Over the next week, she had three more surgeries and half a dozen procedures to stop the bleeding that was taking her life. She experienced liver and kidney failure, kidney dialysis, and hundreds of blood transfusions. At one point, Michael was told that he might have to say goodbye.

Two weeks after the trouble started, her family learned she would make a full recovery. All in all, she spent 3 weeks in the ICU and two weeks in rehab, then 12 weeks of home health care visits.

Baby Luke, after spending 2 weeks in the neonatal intensive care unit, beat his mommy home. Testing shows he may well have escaped permanent damage.

As you listen to Serena's story, you'll hear how she felt God's presence during her ordeal. You'll hear about the love and acts of kindness of oh so many people, including the Trinity family. It was love, kindness, and the power of prayer that pulled her to stay alive, and she is grateful.

"I will say thank you every single day for the rest of my life," she said. "Thank you for being a part of our family and reminding me that we are not alone."


