First Reading: Acts 10:34-43

Peter's sermon, delivered at the home of Cornelius, a Roman army officer, is a summary of the essential message of Christianity: Everyone who believes in Jesus, whose life, death, and resurrection fulfilled the words of the prophets, "receives forgiveness of sins through his name."

³⁴Peter began to speak to [the people]: "I truly understand that God shows no partiality, ³⁵but in every nation anyone who fears him and does what is right is acceptable to him. ³⁶You know the message he sent to the people of Israel, preaching peace by Jesus Christ – he is Lord of all. ³⁷That message spread throughout Judea, beginning in Galilee after the baptism that John announced: ³⁸how God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and with power; how he went about doing good and healing all who were oppressed by the devil, for God was with him. ³⁹We are witnesses to all that he did both in Judea and in Jerusalem. They put him to death by hanging him on a tree; ⁴⁰but God raised him on the third day and allowed him to appear, ⁴¹not to all the people but to us who were chosen by God as witnesses, and who ate and drank with him after he rose from the dead. ⁴²He commanded us to preach to the people and

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to testify that he is the one ordained by God as judge of the living and the dead. ⁴³All the prophets testify about him that everyone who believes in him receives forgiveness of sins through his name."

Sorrow gives way to "fear and great joy" when two women are sent by an angel to proclaim the good news: Jesus is risen!

¹After the sabbath, as the first day of the week was dawning, Mary Magdalene and the other Mary went to see the tomb. ²And suddenly there was a great earthquake; for an angel of the Lord, descending from heaven, came and rolled back the stone and sat on it. ³His appearance was like lightning, and his clothing white as snow. ⁴For fear of him the guards shook and became like dead men. ⁵But the angel said to the women, "Do not be afraid; I know that you are looking for Jesus who was crucified. ⁶He is not here; for he has been raised, as he said. Come, see the place where he lay. ⁷Then go quickly and tell his disciples, 'He has been raised from the dead, and indeed he is going ahead of you to Galilee; there you will see him.' This is my message for you." ⁸So they left the tomb quickly with fear and great joy, and ran to tell his disciples. ⁹Suddenly Jesus met them and said, "Greetings!" And they came to him, took hold of his feet, and worshiped him. ¹⁰Then Jesus said to them, "Do not be afraid; go and tell my brothers to go to Galilee; there they will see me."

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“Easter: What’s The Big Deal?”

Sermon Points to Ponder

Don't just listen to the Sermon...Ponder how you can live it!

Use these questions as a starting point to dive deeper into the sermon each week. Can be used individually, with family and friends, or with your Lifegroup!

1. This Easter is obviously different. Think about favorite Easter memory. What made it special?
2. In Matthew's gospel the angel sits on the rolled away stone. What do you think that symbolizes if anything?
3. Jesus is identified as the Crucified One. What does that mean to you?
4. The women experienced fear and great joy. Usually we think of those as opposites. Are they always? Think of a time you experienced both.
5. How can you become a messenger, sharing your experience of Jesus?
6. How can you be the church where you are?

Grace and peace be to you from our Father and our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. Amen.

Well I want to welcome our members and friends from all over the country to this our streaming Easter service here at Trinity, Camp Hill in Pennsylvania. And I want to thank you for your support you have given us through this last month and one-half!

I think you will agree with me that this Easter has been like no other that I can even remember, and it is certainly not even the Easter that I expected two months ago. What I was expecting was we were going to have a big blow-out service, actually six blow-out services and by the time I preached this sermon I would have had to been able to practice five more times. It would have been a big deal with pomp and circumstance, with

great music, and of course, the celebration of Holy Communion.

We would have prepared ourselves to receive thousands of people as they all crammed together and worshipped the risen Christ. At least that's the way that it should be. But today the faithful are huddled away in homes with social distancing and we find ourselves living in fear, anxiety, disbelief, maybe frustration, and of course a deep desire to get back to normal.

Sometimes Easter is not what you expect.

But it got me thinking about that very first Easter, there you had disciples huddled in fear. If they went outside, they probably covered their faces and were not recognizable. They were doing their own social distancing in the upper room. Not because of a pandemic, but because of fear of the authorities who had crucified Jesus and maybe they would now be coming after them.

After all, Jesus had been betrayed, crucified and maybe those disciples were now going to be the next in line to be arrested and tried. That very first Easter fear and disbelief was the emotional state of the followers of Jesus.

And the women who went to the tomb were no different and the events of that morning as they set out was not what they expected as well. They probably thought they were going to have a nice quiet morning and instead they are confronted with an earthquake, they find guards that are paralyzed, the heavens opened, the stone is rolled away and an angel is sitting on it. Not the morning that they expected!

But then the angel speaks a message, an announcement to them that that morning would change their world and their lives forever. And their fear would be replaced by faith. You know fear can overwhelm us, it can take all of our attention, it can even paralyze us, that's why we use phrases such as we're "Frozen with Fear," or "Trapped by Fear."

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But the message of the angel **begins** with an exorcism; a casting out, a removal of fear. "Do not be afraid," he says "I know that you are looking for Jesus who was crucified. He is not here; for he has been raised, just as he said."

Now notice there is no royal title for Jesus given, no flowery religious language, no grandness that we would expect on such a holy awe-inspiring occasion.

Jesus is the crucified and risen One. The cross becomes his symbol. And the cross becomes the central message of the church's proclamation and a metaphor for its life and service. The cross with its images of self-sacrifice, forgiveness, hope, and salvation.

And the Bible doesn't ask us to take all of this on blind faith. Notice that the angel tells the women "Come and see the place where he lay." Notice, the women don't "see" the resurrection. Nobody does. The stone is rolled away not so that Jesus can get out of the tomb, but to let the women in. They are invited to come into that empty tomb to explore and to believe.

"See for yourself," the angel says. The resurrection is about seeing those mighty acts of God with our eyes of faith. Jesus wants us to use our minds and our hearts in thinking about our faith, and how we live out that faith in the world.

The Commands of God in the Bible give us not only information but also, they do something. They tell us not only what God wants from us, but also gives us the gifts and the strength to do them.

The angel commands the women to go and to share the resurrection with his disciples. Jesus equips them and us for that Easter proclamation. "Go, quickly and tell the disciples that he has been raised." And the women, who came to be the care givers of Jesus' broken body now become messengers of their resurrected Lord! Messengers of probably the most important message the world has ever known.

That in it of itself is shocking since women's testimony in first century Jewish courts was considered inadmissible. If the resurrection was faked by the disciples surely, they would have had made up male witnesses for the story to stick.

But all four gospels agree that on the major details and they make clear that the women were the first witnesses of the resurrection of Jesus. **Because, quite frankly, that's what happened.** Recently Mary Magdalene was declared in the Roman Catholic Church "the Apostle to the Apostles" for her faithful sharing of the resurrection with believers.

The angel continues by telling the women that they will see Jesus in Galilee. Again, another modest detail of Matthew's gospel. But if you think about it, Galilee is where most of the disciples are from. It's home. They will see Jesus at their home. No choirs of angels, no sound of trumpets, no visions of glory. Just him, just Jesus. And that will be enough.

I know many of you have been going through a lot recently. Some of us have felt the sting of loss, or illness, or concern for family members who have been exposed to the virus. We've been saddened by the separation; both physical and emotional distancing that we have had to do. Plans and rites of passage for young people have had to be delayed or even cancelled. Some have suffered deaths in the family or friends only to put the mourning and the final farewell on hold to a later date.

And yet, all around us we see signs of life. Spring is here. The days are becoming longer, and we see signs of awakening, signs of hope. The birds sing, the sun brings warmth, the trees bud, the flowers burst from the ground giving life and color.

Families will check in on each other. Games will be played, grass will be mowed, online homework done, every Netflix movie will be watched. Food will be shared, and prayers will be said.

The big deal is there are signs of resurrection all around us! And sometimes Easter **is** what you

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expect. Christ **is** alive! And the Church remains the church whether it's gathered or scattered.

And so be the church brothers and sisters where you are. Serve those around you where you are. Love those around you where you are. Live and pray in the power and the promise of the resurrection where you are and rejoice. Because Jesus is risen. Alleluia! Amen.
