Music to my ears



At an early age, I remember my parents listening to bands as diverse as Aerosmith and the Fifth Dimension. I remember my first introduction to classical music, a Disney animation of Peter and the Wolf. In my teens, I listened to Tchaikovsky, Hall & Oates, Rachmaninoff, Styx, Bach, AC/DC, Copeland, and U2.

In college I danced to Prince,
David Bowie, Michael Jackson, the
B-52's, and The Human League,
among others. At my college
radio station that was all about
alternative music, I was the
classical music DJ.

After I was ordained a pastor in Queens, New York, my confirmation class introduced me to hip-hop and rap artists. In fact, the rap group Run-D.M.C. got its start in the next neighborhood over

from my church. I also fell in love with the simple and repetitive musical prayer refrains of Taizé, an ecumenical monastery in the Burgundy region of France, and introduced them to congregations I served.

At my second congregation, I was introduced to contemporary Christian music, even being a part of the praise band. The expressive songs touched my spirit in a different way than I was used to, and I enjoyed praising God in this way.

And then came Trinity.

I'll never forget one of the first times I heard our choir. It was June, almost ten years ago, and the anthem was spectacular! I had a big smile on my face as I listened, wondering what the choir could possibly sound like on Christmas and Easter if it was that amazing on a regular Sunday in June.

I continue to appreciate an eclectic mix of music—styles that have always been a part of my life and even harder rock that I would not have considered in my younger days.

Trinity's music stands out among the very best. I continue to be amazed every single week. The choirs, soloists, bells, instrumentalists, ensembles, and praise band are truly inspirational and add so much to our worship life as a congregation. In short, music at Trinity is truly a great treasure!

Story of Tim Koch, Director of Music

Musical talent: not from a spaceship



Church music and H. Timothy Koch are synonymous. Drawn to the piano and organ, he took lessons on both.

But he didn't like to practice. "My parents made me do it," he said.

ven though Tim Koch didn't like practicing for his early lessons on organ and piano, he loved to learn. Playing difficult music came easily.

In fact, before he learned to read music, he played jingles, songs, and TV themes by ear. It's a family story that—at age four!—he played the theme from Captain Kangaroo with one finger on his grandmother's piano.

Natural ability, cultivated

His parents realized that Tim's natural ability had to be cultivated. By high school, in addition to his lessons, he was taking advanced music courses and accompanying the school choir. And he began substituting for the organist in the church where he was then a member, St. John's Lutheran, Steelton.

At 17, Tim began playing regularly at another church near his parents' Chambers Hill home.

After high school, he opted to work full time rather than to study music in college. He needed a career that would provide him with a living, and he knew that most church music positions in this area were part time with no benefits. Accordingly, he worked in telecommunications for Bell Telephone, now Verizon, first in customer service, then as a splicer in the field, then as a systems technician.

Unfulfilling work, and then a change

Those jobs paid the bills, but the work was unfulfilling.

What fulfilled Tim was church music, and he wouldn't give it up. Instead, year by year, in addition to his full-time work, he enhanced his music resume. He studied organ for four years with Trinity's Robert "Bob" Nelson, completed the two-year certificate program at Lebanon Valley College's Church Music Institute, and sang in LVC's respected Alumni Chorale. For the next dozen years, he studied privately at Lebanon Valley with various professors, including the well-known Pierce Getz. Coursework included voice, piano, organ, conducting, and church music history.

Tim's schedule was exhausting: full-time at Bell/ Verizon, part-time at two churches, and his continuing studies. Finally, in 1993, he took a break from the two part-time jobs and began a new direction. He joined Trinity, started to sing in the choir, and became Trinity's substitute music director. In 1998, he became our interim music director and in 1999 was offered the full-time director's job that he holds now.

He met Trinity's Amy Gottshall when he was interim director, and they married in 2001.

Tim likes pretty much all the roles that come with his position. Playing the organ and conducting the choirs (as many as 50 members) are favorites, followed closely by playing the piano, working with the handbell choirs, and planning our popular concert series. The most time-consuming of these roles is putting together the many concerts over the years, including distributing all the orchestra parts.

Two of Tim's most memorable concerts were the Duruflé Requiem (Concert Choir, 2019) and Brahms' Requiem (Concert Choir, 2008). He called them "the hardest and the most demanding" and said they were "most satisfying as to what we



achieved as a church choir."

Spiritual gift from God, with an impact on people's lives

"During my time here, people have given hundreds of thousands of dollars in music bequests," he noted. "Such generosity demonstrates the impact that Trinity's music program has made on people's lives. I am both grateful and humbled at the significance."

"We don't do anything 'half' here," he continued. "We're blessed to have talented people who are top notch and who work hard. That's the least we can do. It's what we owe to our creator."

Tim knows his talent is a spiritual gift. "It sure didn't come from a spaceship! It's all a gift from God. Everything."



Story of Debbie Wilson, Director of Contemporary Music

Odd statement from a college roommate



ow did Debbie Wilson land in Camp Hill, Pa., from a ranch in Wyoming? What were the twists and turns along the way? And why does she get emotional when recounting her journey?

Engineering, not music, would provide a living

Debbie loved music from an early age. But participating in music opportunities was not easy because school was 35 miles away, with transportation limited to the school bus. Even so, she played in the band and sang in the chorus.

After getting her driver's license, participation was easier. Debbie was able to join a special school singing group that performed at luncheons, dinners, and other functions.

When it came to college, Debbie chose engineering as a major because she believed that field would provide a good living. She enjoyed science and tech courses, and she also liked the challenge of being a woman in what was then a man's field.

It didn't take her long to learn that engineering was not the right decision. She changed her major to music.

Still, the question remained about how well she could make a living with music as her primary field of study.

Debbie's solution showed her practical side when she added journalism, marketing, business, and economics to her major.

An odd statement from a college roommate

A college roommate told Debbie she should be doing music for a church. The comment came from out of the blue. Debbie was taken aback. Seriously?

Only years later did Debbie understand that the comment was prescient and, yes, part of God's plan for change.

But she wasn't there yet.

Marketing, marriage, overseas, and then Trinity's steeple

After college graduation in 1983, Debbie landed a marketing position in the financial services industry. She wrote ad copy and promotional materials. It was a good job, and fun.

Three years later, she married Rick Wilson (see page 12), an Air Force officer stationed in Cheyenne. They moved to Tucson, Arizona, as Rick trained for an 18-month overseas assignment in Belgium.

Rick left the Air Force after Belgium. He and Debbie spent some time figuring out their careers and ultimately ended up in Camp Hill, where Rick had accepted a position.

They were also looking for a church, and they just happened to see Trinity's iconic steeple lighted up at night. Their choice was made.

"It was like coming home," Debbie said, recalling her roots in Wyoming. Debbie's mother was a Lutheran church organist, and her great-grandmother was a Lutheran missionary from Norway.

A catalyst: Asked to join the unstructured band

It was the late 1990s. Trinity had only traditional worship and was thinking about adding a more contemporary service. Some musicians were playing for worship on Sunday nights, and Debbie was offered the chance to observe. She made suggestions and was asked to join the somewhat unstructured band.

In April 2002, she joined the staff as Director of Contemporary Music. By this time, the new contemporary worship service had moved to Sunday mornings.



"Music and Trinity and the gifts that God gave me resulted in my making the choice to work here," said Debbie. She simply could not keep herself from becoming involved with—and belonging to—this new musical group.

"It wasn't an intentional faith decision. It just WAS. I loved my faith, loved Trinity, loved the people. Still do. Again, it was no choice. To build something out of the experience is just one big faith expression."

And that's how FaithX got its name. Originally known as Expressions of Faith, it became Faith Expressions, and now FaithX.

Gifts from and to God

The emotion catches Debbie off guard when she talks about the journey she's been on. She's accustomed to being practical. But "this music thing" happened, and practical matters became less important.

In short, music changed her understanding of who she is, what she is meant to do, and how she is connected to God.

"Music is the biggest evidence of God," she said. "It's a language beyond words. For me, pitches and rhythms are not of this earth. They are gifts *from* God as much as they are connections **to** God."

"My work at Trinity is not a job. It's a lifestyle. It's my faith. It's a calling." ■



Story of Amy Koch, Director of Children's Music

Love of kids, love of music



Amy Koch got her start as a volunteer children's choir director at Trinity in January 1999. The prior director had left, and our then-pastor asked Amy to help him be the director.

Amy Gottshall was an obvious choice when Trinity needed a volunteer choir director. She was newly degreed in elementary education with a concentration in early childhood ed, active in our music program, raised in a seriously musical family, and just all-around talented and bubbly.

Oh, and in first grade, she had started out in the Trinity children's choir.

Amy said yes, she'd be glad "to help." So together she and the pastor recruited 25+ kiddos from kindergarten through sixth grade. Together they had their first meeting/rehearsal. But after that beginning, suddenly there was no more "together," and she was on her own!

That's Miss Amy, as she is fondly known. Give her a job and she's on it.

Enough hours in the day? Enough musically talented family members?

The part-time position is salaried now. Amy is also a Trinity Preschool teacher three mornings a week, a private math tutor, the long-time director of our ever-popular VBS, and leader of our Faith Connect Kids' large group (K-Gr. 4) on Sundays.

She's also the mother of Alison, 20, a cello performance major at Messiah University, and Tyler, 18, a first-year college student. Both Ali and Ty were active in our music ministry, and Ali still shares her cello talent with us often.

Then there's Amy's mother, Nancy Martin (see page 15), long-time Trinity member, also musically gifted, as were Amy's late father and grandparents.

And of course there's Tim Koch. Amy and Tim met when Tim was Trinity's interim music director. Clearly they had a lot in common, and they married in 2001.

Always music

"There's always music in our house," said Amy. "Guitar, cello, piano, singing—always music."

"Music is so good for the brain," she explained. "It's the math side of the

brain. It gives you endorphins, makes you happy. It's so fun."

"Children's choir is especially fun," she added.

"At the same time they're having fun, the kiddos are learning about leading worship. In the choir, they learn they are not 'performing' for the congregation, but rather they are singing a song to help them get closer to God."

Amy made it clear that, in short, the children are part of the worship experience. "They are worship leaders, not stage performers!"

Amy believes that clapping after the children sing is okay because it's applause for the gift of music that's being shared. The children also understand that if there's no clapping, God is still applauding them for their music.

What's a "Mom cry" song?

Some songs are not fast and upbeat, and often those are the songs that move listeners to tears. Amy and her choirs have a name for these slow-moving songs. They're called "Mom cry" songs, meaning

that many moms (and others!) will shed happy tears because the children's voices are so beautiful.

Whenever the choirs sing, said Amy, it means a lot for listeners to thank the children

for their gift of music and their contribution to worship.

Another way to show support is simply to show up, whether to worship or special music events, and also to participate in our music programs. Choir members of all ages are welcome at Trinity.

"If God gave you the gift of musical ability—singing, playing—you should give it back to God," said Amy. "You should share your musical gifts at church, and you can share them elsewhere, too, whether at school or other places in the community."

Memory of a truly Silent Night

Amy recalls an event that still gives her goosebumps. It was years ago when the power went out during a nighttime Christmas concert, leaving the church pitch black. There were at least 700 people present, including 30-plus children in the choir. Someone in the congregation started to sing Silent Night, and everyone joined in. A few people waved phones or other electronic devices that shone soft lighting. No one was scared by the darkness.

"It was beautiful," remembered Amy. "Adults and kids alike were moved, calmed by the power of music."

Martha Herold—then Martha Schroeder—remembers the exact date more than 50 years ago when she met her husband-to-be, Chuck. It was February 7, 1972. They were both singing with the Gettysburg College Choir.



They married on July 27, 1975. It's fitting they should still be singing together today.

Martha joined Trinity's choir 39 years ago, soon after becoming a Trinity member. She had been in organized choirs since middle school, including church choir and, of course, the college choir where she and Chuck met. At the time, that choir sang sacred music almost exclusively.

"Those experiences formed a love of church music in me," she said. "Singing sacred music draws me closer to God. Often

the music cuts through my 'busy brain' and forces me to focus on—and to feel the message of—God's love and salvation better than the spoken word alone. I truly hope that our listeners benefit in the same way."

At Martha's invitation, Chuck joined Trinity's choir in 1984. "I have always enjoyed and been inspired by sacred choral and organ music," he said.

Singing liturgy is important to Chuck's faith. He considers it a privilege to sing "many of the greatest and sublime sacred choral works of the last seven centuries," and he feels God's presence in works such as Faure's Requiem and Brahm's German Requiem.

"Many of Tim's postludes transport me to heaven," he said.

When asked, Martha noted two things that stand out about her participation in Trinity's music: (1) when the choir sang at Country Meadows to honor the 99th birthday of a former member living in memory support, and (2) when the choir sings Christmas carols at Bethany Village. "Watching the faces of residents as they sing hymns or carols from memory has taught me that we can still connect to God through music, even when our minds fade and our words go away. As I age, I am comforted to know that."

Both Chuck and Martha appreciate the talents, dedication, and leadership of Tim Koch, Debbie Wilson, and Amy Koch, as well as the gifts and talent of all the volunteer musicians and the support of Trinity's Arts Team. "The depth and breadth of our music programs is wonderful," said Martha.

The Herolds are further united in their thoughts of how others can show support for Trinity's music.

From Martha: "I recommend participation in any ensemble, and that parents encourage their kids to participate also! It is time well spent, and a wonderful way to honor God. Please attend programs. Please thank our leaders every chance you get."

And from Chuck: "Pray for music at Trinity. Support and attend Trinity's music programs. It's also important to support music education in schools and in the community."






They began to change their minds following a visit to Trinity where they found themselves so warmly welcomed.

"We were immediately drawn to the inspirational level of music within the worship services," Amy explained, "but unsure how we could be involved and still worship alongside our young family."

The solution offered by thenpastor Stewart Hardy was simple: He told the Heinlys he saw their concern not as a problem but as an opportunity. "We can figure it out," he said.

"And so began our many years of magically appearing in the choir loft for the anthems and spending the remainder of the service in the congregation alongside our daughters, Briana and Kierra," said Amy.

Both Mark and Amy believe that Trinity's dedication to music has resulted in the ability of our choirs to present large choral works and a level of music "far beyond that of an ordinary congregation."

The Heinlys say that Christmas at Trinity concerts are particularly memorable. Not only could their entire family participate, but all the different musical groups could come together, too, resulting in a "unique and spiritually uplifting program for the congregation and community."

"It just doesn't feel quite like Christmas until the concert at Trinity!" they agreed.

Daughters Briana and Kierra took part in Trinity's music opportunities starting at age five and continuing through high school. They sang in the choirs, played bells, and participated in the instrumental music programs where they shared their gifts of playing violin and piano.

It's no surprise that their musical interests, talents, and experiences continue to the present.

Briana, 24, graduated from Susquehanna University in May 2020 with a double major in biology and violin performance. Currently a third-year medical student, she is still musically involved and leads a group of other medical students called the MedNotes, who sing not only for themselves but also for others.

Kierra, 20, is taking time off from her formal college education to try her hand at various music-oriented endeavors, including songwriting and composing and continuing to play violin and piano. She has even auditioned for American Idol!

I began singing in the Concert Choir in fall of 2018. A friend suggested that I check out Trinity's Concert Choir as I was then singing in a number of area concert groups. I contacted Tim Koch in August 2018, received a prompt reply, and was invited to come to rehearsal and "give it a try." In so doing, I found a wonderful group devoted to music. 
The first time I was assigned to "fly solo" on the sound board was for a Christmas Eve service, one of the most attended services of the year. I was so nervous that I would mess up!
